Architect Hopes to Give New Life to Funeral Home Property

A vacant mortuary that's been on the brink of foreclosure for more than a year is now getting a new life as an office and community space.

Architect John Harriss owns the property at 3207 Central Ave. NE. His firm was originally hired to design a condo project at the site.

When sales got off to a slow start, Harriss and a business partner bought the property from the initial developers in 2006 with hopes of improving sales. The condos ultimately failed, and the property has been in financial limbo since 2007.

A green, thrifty renovation is now underway to convert the funeral home into a multi-tenant office building, with Harriss' own architecture firm serving as the anchor tenant.

"We saw an opportunity to take a building that was destined for the landfill and reuse it," Harriss said.

Harriss Architecture, which specializes in schools, senior housing and sustainable design, hopes to transform the Central Ave. site into a showcase for green building design.

The vision also calls for transforming the former casket showroom into a community meeting space for neighborhood and nonprofit groups.

The renovation is a work in progress, and Harriss said it will continue to be piecemeal project, with work being done as time and money is available.

Green building features already incorporated include energy-saving windows, non-toxic paints and insulation made from recycled blue jeans. Harriss would like to add more ambitious green components later like rooftop solar panels and pervious pavers in the parking lot.

Harriss hopes up to three other organizations will eventually join the architecture firm in building. Shared amenities, such as parking, a kitchenette and conference room, are aimed at making the space appealing as an incubator for design professionals.

The original condo proposal called for a four-story, 30-unit building with a brownstone exterior. Only 20 percent of the units were sold, well short of the 50 percent generally required to begin construction for condos.

When the city's condo market declined, Harriss briefly pursued a mixed-use development with street-level retail shops and apartments above that. Harriss was unable to find investors to back that plan, though.

Harriss' business partner declared personal bankruptcy last year, prompting their lender to intensify pressure for a resolution. Meanwhile, Harriss' architecture firm was laying off employees and struggling to meet obligations as clients suspended projects due to the economy.

"One year ago today it was just an absolute disaster," Harriss said. "It was a dark Christmas."

In a search for inspiration, Harriss began "nesting" at the old funeral home, spending long hours wandering its spaces. He set up a white board and started sketching out concepts that might save his investment.

"The fact that it was a funeral home kind of freaked me out a bit, but I started to feel more comfortable up here," Harriss said.

As the winter days grew longer, so too did the dark lift from around Harriss. The brainstorming and soul-searching led to the office building idea, which his lender supported. State Bank of Delano loaned \$50,000 to jump start the renovation, and Harriss spent much of this year working on the space himself.

Harriss Architecture moved into the building in June, working out of boxes in a makeshift office in the former visiting room. They've since converted the old chapel into a finished office space with with about half a dozen work stations.

Harriss plans to share an update on the project with neighborhood residents at the Waite Park Community Council meeting on Nov. 4. He also intends to share a proposal to close 32nd Ave. NE east from Central Avenue to the first alley. Harriss

would like to close the section of street and converted the area to a garden or green space.

"We've hardly got an easy path ahead of us," Harriss said, but "I've always stuck with this property. I've always believed in this site."

Don't Make Life Easy for Burglars

On September 25, there were five burglaries or attempted burglaries of garages in the area between 30th and 31st Avenues NE and between Hayes and Cleveland Streets NE. And, there have been others in recent months. In most, if not all cases, the garages were not locked. Much like a lion surveying a herd, burglars seek out the easy targets. Rather than breaking a door or popping a lock, they will go from garage to garage or house to house seeking an invitation to easy entry.

Please don't make a burglar's job any easier. Here are some simple tips to remember:

- Call 911 if you hear strange noises or see suspicious behavior in the alley. Keep your garage doors closed and LOCKED.
- Keep outside lights on or use motion sensing lights to increase visibility for both you and your neighbors.
- Secure your garage service door with deadbolt locks. Secure windows with bars or locks.
- If you don't have an electric garage door opener, install a padlock 1/4" above a roller in the overhead door track when the door is closed.
- Chain down valuable items like snow-blowers, bikes and snowmobiles.
- Lock your car doors.

We can help -- the Waite Park Community Council offers a Security Rebate Program to help you with these simple security improvements. A \$50 rebate is offered for items such as motion detecting lights, deadbolt locks, window locks and a host of other security related items. NE Library Renovation

Hennepin County Library conducted a survey in September asking customers which library they would use during the renovation. In response to customer feedback, St. Anthony Library will be open longer hours on Saturdays--from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.--from Saturday, October 31 until Northeast Library reopens in 2011. Nearby Hennepin County libraries include:

- *St. Anthony* – 2941 Pentagon Drive NE, 952-847-6075, Hours: 12-8 M & T / 10-5 W,F & Sat (Sat. as of Oct. 31) / 12-5 Th / Closed Sun
- *Pierre Bottineau* – 55 Broadway St. NE, 952-847-2850, Hours: 12-8 T & Th / 10-6 W, F & Sat / Closed Sun & M
- *Central* – 300 Nicollet Mall, 612-630-6000 Hours: 10-8 T & Th / 10-6 W, F & Sat / 12-5 Sun / Closed M

While Northeast Library is closed, students who need homework assistance are encouraged to use the Homework Hub at the Central Library. Online homework help is available for grades 3 - 12 in English and Spanish 1 - 11 p.m. seven days a week: www.hclib.org/pub/info/homework.cfm.

During the renovation the familiar faces of Northeast staff will be at nearby libraries to provide their usual great service to the community. "Northeast Minneapolis – with its civic-minded residents and vibrant arts community – relies on the library as a community and cultural center. Libraries are the great equalizers and this library has been a popular destination for kids and seniors and a mainstay of the community," said Commissioner Stenglein. "We're certain that this exciting, needed, and beautiful renovation and expansion will make the library even more of a magnet for area residents of all ages."

In planning for the renovated library, the Northeast Library Advisory Team, which consists of members of the community, provided essential feedback on what the community wants in a library.

Andrea Voss is Waite Park Community Council's representative.

Improvements include expanded and enhanced space for children and teens, comfortable reading and quiet study areas, and triple the current number of public computers.

Wireless access will be available. Homework help space will be available for after-school learning. Design plans also include a new early literacy and interactive discovery zone for young children. There will be a display area for local art. There will be improved staff workspaces for operational efficiencies.

More visible and welcoming entrances will open onto an improved parking area and onto Central Avenue. The library addition will be located on the southeast corner of the current site, facing Central Avenue. New flexible meeting space will be in the interior of the building. The renovated library will have flexible interior space to meet changing programming and community needs. The number of parking spaces will be the same, 24.

Sustainable features incorporated into the renovation include maximizing use of natural daylight through window design, new and updated mechanical systems for energy efficient operation, use of renewable products, native plantings, and a storm water management system that includes a rainwater garden. The new boiler has already been installed, about a year ago.

Hennepin County Library Director Lois Langer Thompson said, "We're very excited about the Northeast renovation. The design was developed in partnership with the local citizen advisory team and will enhance library service in a great neighborhood."

Northeast Library was built in 1973 to replace the original Carnegie library building built in 1915. It is currently 14,500 square feet. The renovated and expanded library will be 16,221 square feet. The architect for the project is Cuningham Group Architecture, P.A.

The project cost is \$5,235,000. The selling of bonds approved by Minneapolis voters in the library referendum in 2000 provided core funding of \$3.785 million for the renovation. The Hennepin County Board augmented the Minneapolis funding by \$1.45 million to provide a more complete project for the community.

In 2008, customers borrowed more than 176,000 books and other materials from the Northeast Library.

The Northeast Library will have a 952 area code instead of 612 when it reopens, as part of a network consolidation. Bottineau has a new 952 number; Central doesn't yet. The merger of Hennepin County Library and Minneapolis Public Library has provided opportunities to decrease overall operating costs and increase efficiencies by eliminating duplicate technology systems. The existing county system had the capacity to unify the systems into one network. With one phone system, customers can call one number and be transferred anywhere in the 41-library system. Customers can expect to hear standardized voice messaging at the libraries and staff will be able to communicate more easily with each other.

Another change due to the merger is the establishment of Friends groups at each library in Minneapolis. Minneapolis Public Library had one Friends organization for the entire system, but Hennepin County libraries all have their own Friends groups. Three "Join the Friends of the Library!" Planning Meetings were held October 20, 21, and 22 at Northeast, Linden Hills, and East Lake libraries to plan for a grassroots Friends group for each library in Minneapolis. Minneapolis General Election Tuesday, November 3 – Vote!

On Tuesday, November 3rd, voters will be able to rank their choices for Mayor, City Council, Board of Estimate & Taxation, and Park & Recreation Board. This new voting method called Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) allows voters to rank multiple candidates in order of preference. Voters may rank up to three candidates for each municipal office in order of the voter’s preference.

The polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Waite Park Neighborhood includes all of Ward 1, Precinct 2 (1-2) and part of Ward 1, Precinct 3 (1-3). The precinct boundary is 32nd Avenue. Precinct 1-2 is north of 32nd Avenue and the polling place is Waite Park Community School, 1810 34th Avenue Northeast. Precinct 1-3 is south of 32nd Avenue and the polling place is Northeast Middle School, 2955 Hayes Street Northeast.

A unmarked blue sample ballot for 1-2 is inserted in this newsletter. The offices for 1-3 are the same but the candidates names are in different order; they rotate by precinct. Please remove it from the newsletter. You may mark it and take it with you to the polling place election day; but remember there’s no campaigning within 100 feet of the

polling place. Please carry it privately with you to and from the polling place.

The last Voice had a full-page in-depth overview of RCV. The City is conducting an extensive outreach and education program. Visit www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us and click on the VOTE button or call 311 for election information, including registering on election day, voting by absentee ballot, voting for people with a disability, and a new online interactive ballot tool that lets the voter know if they make a mistake filling out the ballot.

The Minneapolis Elections Department is holding 14 events between October 19th and November 2nd to educate voters about RCV. Voters questions will be answered and they will be able to practice voting so they know what to expect on Election Day – the first having been held at Waite Park. There are seven events between Monday, October 26th and Monday, November 2nd. Meetings nearest to Waite Park are on Tuesday, October 27th from 6:30 to 7:55 p.m. at Southeast Library, 1222 4th St. SE., and on Saturday, October 31st from 10 a.m. to noon at North Regional Library, 1315 Lowry Avenue North.



In 2009, 65 gardeners grew their food in 71 plots, two of which are handicap.
